A WORD FROM TRUETT

Several years ago a man found himself in an elevator with Lee Iacocca, chairman of the Chrysler Corp. at the time. The man inquired, "You are Lee Iacocca, are you not?" The automobile executive acknowledged that he was. "Mr. Iacocca," the man said, "I want to tell you how much I enjoy your television commercials advertising Chrysler." To this compliment Iacocca replied, "Sir, I could care less what you think of my commercials. What I want to know is, what kind of car do you drive?" Iacocca knew that if the people did not buy Chrysler products, the commercials were useless.

Pastor, the bottom line to our ministry is sales, not sales-talk. The question is, are people buying what you are selling — or sharing — the good news of salvation? Are people being saved and added to the kingdom? We need a new birth of evangelism in our churches today.

LEADERSHIP

Tips from Marsha Sharp, retired coach of Texas Tech Women's Basketball Team from Tall Enough to Coach:

- Delegation is important. "I could come to work every day and stay extremely busy and really accomplish tasks that, in one sense, are very important. I could wash towels, sweep the floor, clean the locker room, and stuff would accrue in the mail. I would have worked hard and, believe me, and I'm not above doing any one of those tasks. However, I must be efficient in delegating any one of those tasks to capable staff members so that I can tackle other areas such as getting administrative support, connecting with fans, dealing with media or studying film. There is plenty of work to go around, but I was hired to lead delegation is a must. (pgs. 36-37)
- Everyone must feel needed and must feel some ownership, not only with this particular team, but the program as a whole. A successful coach makes each player feel important from applauding their efforts and work out to make them an important part of all sports activities, to confiding in them important decisions about the team in general.
- You need to set long-term goals, but you must also have short-term goals. These are a variety of steps necessary to reach that long-term goal. Goals should be broken down within the seasons, each game, etc. Some things should be non-negotiable.
- It's been particularly distressing to me throughout the years that so many kids reach an age of accountability and don't know how to write thank-you notes. Unfortunately, too many people believe that their fellow human beings owe them acts of kindness. (pg. 109)
- When you're blessed with such great talent and immense opportunity, you have a very direct responsibility to give back. There are many ways to do that, but one is to give confidence to as many people as possible. (pg. 114)

Every minister would be wise to heed Marsha's advice.

PASTORING

One of the duties of every minister is to help people deal with death. It will help us to remember the life and influence of British pastor John Donne. He pastored St. Paul's Cathedral in London. He was an exceedingly popular preacher and writer but preoccupied with thoughts of death. He asked if a statue of him should be placed in the cathedral that would be wrapped in a shroud as if dead. That's the way he appears in statue form today – wrapped in a shroud as if dead.

In his *Devotions Upon Emergent Occasions*, Donne wrote the words that Ernest Hemingway used for the title of one of his finest novels: "No man is an island, entire of itself; every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main; if a clod bee washed away by the sea, Europe is the lesser...any man's death diminishes me, because I am involved in mankind; and therefore never send to know for whom the bell tolls; it tolls for thee."
