"There was 100 percent participation .... It's been amazing to see how generous the Baylor community

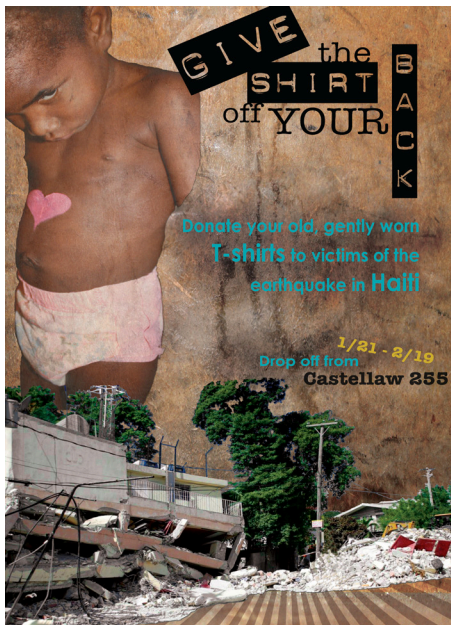
has been," Perry said.

## DOUG FERDON WELCOMES DISTINGUISHED GUESTS, HELPS GRADS FIND JOBS

Baylor alumni and Hannibal Publishing owners Louis and Kay Moore visited Dr. Doug Ferdon's class this fall to talk about journalism law and ethics.

Louis, former *Lariat* editor, and Kay, former staff writer, both worked for *The Houston Chronicle*, he as religion editor, she as a reporter. Later Kay worked 14 years for United Press International, and Louis became head PR person for the Southern Baptist Christian Life Commission.

Today they publish books with former Baylor football coach Grant Teaff and books in the Christian studies and life areas.

Last summer, Ferdon had calls from students he taught more than 25 years ago who were looking for jobs. He also was helping recent graduates find jobs. The recession and the big changes in the newspaper industry "brought about some different problems."

Ferdon also invited husband-wife musical team Kenny Greenberg and Ashley Cleveland to his popular culture class, where students learned that:

Kenny is one of six A-list studio electric guitar players in Nashville. Ashley is a well-known (and Grammy nominated) singer/song-writer.

They also told students they were going to try to talk their son into attending Baylor. They thought their experience here — singing, talking and visiting — was rewarding. They met with library staff, with Robert Darden about his work with The Black Gospel Music Restoration Project, and with Ferdon's class, and they now believe Baylor is a great place to be a student, Ferdon said.

## MIA MOODY

Mia Moody and co-author Bruce Dorries, another Baylor journalism alumnus, had an article published in *Media Report to Women*. Their article focuses on the media's framing of missing women.

Moody's book, *Black and Mainstream Press' Framing of Racial Profiling: A Historical Perspective*,

## KATIE COOK TRAVELS TO ITALY PEACE CONFERENCE

Katie Cook traveled to Italy in February as part of a media team covering the Global Baptist Peace Conference in Castel Gandolfo just outside Rome.

Around 350 Baptists and others—in the larger Christian community and people of the Islamic faith—gathered from 59 countries for a week of workshops

and plenary worship services.

Many endured considerable risk and hardship to get to the conference. These people told incredible stories of the struggle for peace and justice in their homelands.

Cook also made a pilgrimage to Assisi and said she “finally” made her profession in the Order of Ecumenical Franciscans.

## ROBERT DARDEN

Robert Darden received a spring and summer 2011 sabbatical to work on his current book, *Nothing But Love in God's Water: The Influence of Black Sacred Music on the Civil Rights Movement*.

## CAROL PERRY

Carol Perry took an advanced studies class in Russian iconography at Princeton over the summer. Perry is a gifted artist, and her gold-gilt icons are much treasured by collectors across the country.

## MIKE BLACKMAN HOSTS MIXED BAG OF PROFESSIONALS, INCLUDING AUTHOR JEFF GUINN

Texas author Jeff Guinn spoke to journalism students about organizing research for their stories. Guinn is the author of widely praised *Go Down Together*, the story of Depression-era gangsters Bonnie and Clyde published earlier this year. During his October visit, Guinn brought samples of how he organizes his notes in a time line. He expects that to run about 400 pages when he completes research for his latest book (set in the Old West and tentatively titled *The Last Gunfight*).

He told students he'd read 100 books and conducted 85 interviews and could in no way write anything “from a feature story to a book without organizing my notes this way .... I learned this technique from Robert Caro about 15 years ago.”

Guinn hosted three Baylor journalism students at UT-Arlington when he interviewed writer Gar-

riison Keillor, widely known from radio's “A Prairie Home Companion.” The students were members of Blackman's Radford Seminar on profile writing.

Dr. Mike Stricklin, retired University of Nebraska journalism professor, and Dean Eubank, news editor at *The Fort Worth Star-Telegram* for more than two decades, also spoke to the *Lariat* staff and several journalism classes in early October.

Both Stricklin and his wife, Chere, graduated from Baylor and worked on the *Lariat*. Mike and Chere now live in Brazil, where they both served in the Peace Corps in the late 1960s. Stricklin taught journalism at Baylor in the 1970s.

After his visit, Eubank critiqued several weeks of *Lariats* for the student staff.

A book for which Blackman served as the editor and researcher—

*The Godfather of Poker* by Doyle Brunson and Texas author Mike Cochran – hit shelves in November.

Early reviews have been favorable, and Cardoza Publishing had gone to a second printing by the time of the book's release.

The autobiography of the world's poker icon traces his life from a West Texas schoolboy sports star – all-state in basketball, state champion miler – to his unlikely acquaintance with poker. (Brunson, just out of college in the mid-'50s, was then selling adding machines.) Then the book moves to his days on the Texas gambling circuit and finally, to the glitz of Las Vegas.

Cochran, whose byline is one of Texas' most recognizable, spoke to Baylor students in November 2008 about his coverage of the Kennedy assassination in 1963 when he worked for the Associated Press.

# Faculty/Graduate Students

CASSY BURLESON

GRADUATE STUDENTS

Cassy Burleson spent a spring day visiting with faculty and speaking to about 100 agriculture and yearbook students at Lorena High School.

"I was impressed by the maturity and intelligence of the students and developed a deeper appreciation of my hometown's high school. Educators there accomplish miracles on a daily basis. So now I'm both a Leopard and a Bear fan," Burleson said.

Burleson published an essay and poetry chapter in *Langdon Review*, a

refereed journal published by Texas Tech.

She also delivered four presentations at Langdon Weekend alongside "people far more notable," such as several Texas poet laureates, editors, journalists, and award-winning film makers, photographers and artists. "Journalism in the 21st Century," a panel discussion in which she participated, was coordinated by Judith Segura, author of the recent book *Belo Corporation*.

Graduate students in the MIJ program are currently participating in internships [or will be in the summer]: Ryan Pierce is at the European Journalism Centre in Brussels. Cody Winchester is at National Post in Toronto. Aisha Tariq is at the Associated Press in Abu Dhabi.

FangFang Zhang is currently finishing her internship at Voice of America, where she is working from 4 a.m. to 12 p.m. each day putting the Mandarin broadcast together for listeners. Joanna Wuertz is at Mercy Ships, and Yiliu Wang is at Mission Waco.

Ryan Pierce, Cody Winchester and Yiliu Wang were all co-authors on papers that were presented at the AEJMC Annual Meeting (International organization for Journalism and Mass Communication).

We have had a good year with getting papers co-authored by graduate students accepted at reviewed conferences.

MIJ students Chad Shanks, Joanna Wuertz, Caroline Korsawe, Chelsea Quackenbush, Kristine Davis, Billy Collins, Zhenge Zhang and Bethany Poller were all authors of papers which were accepted at either the Western Social Science Association or the AEJMC Midwinter Meeting.

From Helene Massart, a Masters in Journalism graduate, who wrote to the journalism department about Ryan Pierce, who is doing his internship at the European Journalism Centre in Brussels:

"Just wanted to let you know that Ryan is sitting in my office, and he is doing great! I believe he is still under the shock of this EU thing ... but everything seems fine! I'm actually moving back to the States in six weeks. So excited!"

## PR Job Market 'Bullish'

Believe it or not, working with Baylor's legal department to ensure Memos of Understanding with all internship sites wasn't the best thing that's happened in PR lately. There's even more good news.

Cassy Burleson reported that employers of PR interns doubled their participation in the career portfolio evaluation process in December, resulting in at least three reviews for each Advanced PR student's career portfolio.

Several students also developed electronic portfolios.

"Employer feedback surprised us," Burleson said. All employer reviewers preferred both electronic material *and* a hard-bound version.

Site visits also were conducted to each in-

ternship site last fall.

"Interns get some great professional coaching from their internship site supervisors and others.

"We're grateful for the full-blown participation of mentors throughout the Baylor community and our local PRSA group. We even have outlying mentors in McGregor at the Texas Forestry Association and Hillsboro Community College," Burleson said.

Burleson said interns should get all the credit for the enthusiasm of local PR professionals.

"Our interns are value-added on the job, and employers are spreading the word," she said.

A study to determine whether the department's recent graduates have jobs or are in graduate school,

how long it took graduates to get a job, and what the entry-level salary is on-going.

"So far, we've received information from a couple of students who started at over \$50,000 a year and a couple of folks who started at over \$40,000. In these times, that's remarkable," Burleson said.

"And we're just as proud of those who are sacrificing salary to do more good to the world as Peace Corps and non-profit professionals."

Burleson encouraged graduates to respond to the e-mail from Dr. Sara Stone or get in touch with the department via its new Facebook page established by Kevin Tankersley "so we can stay in touch to help you network in the future," Burleson said.
